A. PURPOSE

This policy is intended to set forth $Z = \mu o v C C / v \cdot \delta \delta \mu \delta$ ($u C C C = [- ~ / - P \mu]$ and practical procedures for ensuring that its use of copyrighted matter in the Internet is legal and appropriate. These provisions include those required to limit liability of IA under the federal Digital Millennium Copyright Act of 1998 (DMCA) for potential copyright infringements.

B. POLICY STATEMENT

The Clinary Institute of America CIA) respects the rights of copyright holders, their agents and representatives, and strives to protect those rights through compliarittecopyright law prohibiting the reproduction, distribution, public display or public performer of copyrighted materials over the Internet without permission of the copyright holder, except in accordance with fair use or other applicable exceptions. The CIA also respects the legal and appropriate use by individuals of copyrighted materials on the ernet, including but not limited to ownership, license or permission, and fair use under the United States Copyright Act.

The CIA asserts its interest time safe harbor from copyright infringement liability afforded by compliance with the Digital Mllennium and Copyright AcD(MCA). The CIA has established procedures required to ensure compliance with the DMCA, as set for the iD to the Millennium and Copyright Act Policy

Employees and Students are responsible for understanding and compl**yinthe** irights of copyright owners in their use of copyrighted materials. Information can be found at the United States Copyright Office.

Unauthorized peeto-peer file sharing on the CIA networks is prohibited and blocked by bandwidth-shaping technology. Violations of copyright law or this policy, including the use of technology to circumvent the blocking of peter-peer file sharing, may subject employees and students to disciplinary action, including but not limited to termination of network privileges, well as civil and criminal liabilities general, anyone found liable for civil copyright infringement may be ordered to pay either actual damages or fixed damages from \$750 to \$30,000 per work infringed. For willful infringement, a court may awardou\$150,000 per work infringement of up to five years, and fines of up to \$250,000 per offense.

When properly notified of the potential copyright infringemettle CIAmay, but does not have to, attempt to determine if the use of the materials in question complies with copyright law. TheCIAwill make reasonable effost contact the site or page owner of the materials in question to arrange for the materials in question to be taken dowAtternatively, the CIA will promptly disable access to threaterials in questionunless it has been determined that the use is lawful.

The owner of the site or page of the alleggeighfringing material whether it is the CIA or an individual other than the CIA (the user) may exercise their counter notice procedure rights set forth below.

IV. Counter Notice Procedures

After voluntary take down oraccess to the material in question disabled, the CIA may, but does not have to, proceed to counter notification ites behalf or behalf of its Employees and Students. Counternotification must be made in writing to the Designated Agent.

A counter notice may claim only either that the complaining party is mist**akeh**uding on the basis of fair use) nd the material in question is lawfully posted; or that the material in question has been misidentified.
